Nebraska Bowlers Top Final Poll

NASHVILLE, TN---NCAA champion Nebraska topped the final poll conducted by the National Ten Pin Coaches Association, the official poll of collegiate bowling.

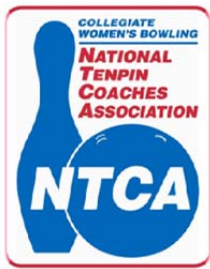
The Huskers defeated Vanderbilt in the national championship game April 13 in Canton, Mi., to win 20 points toward the Capital One Cup. Vanderbilt moved up three spots finishing second in the final poll, followed by Maryland-Eastern Shore, fresh off its USBC Collegiate Championship. Arkansas State remained in fourth for third consecutive poll.

Central Missouri placed fifth in the final poll after holding the top spot much of the year. Fairleigh Dickinson moved two spots to sixth; while Sam Houston State was seventh and Wisconsin Whitewater eighth mirroring their finishes at the NCAA Championships. Ninth place Stephen F. Austin and tenth place Adelphi maintained the positions from the April poll.

Since the NCAA Championships was the only competition since the last poll was released the teams ranked 11-20 from the April poll were carried over to the final poll.

Point system:

NTCA voters rank the top 20 teams on their ballot. Each position has a designated point value, ranging from 32 points for first place and one point for twentieth place. To be ranked teams need to equal or surpass the minimum vote criteria, which is one vote for every eight ballots submitted. In this poll, three votes were necessary. The actual ranking position is determined by using the adjusted point standings, which lists in priority order the total points a school has accumulated after the highest and lowest votes are dropped.

The specific point values are: 1st place = 32 points, 2nd = 29, 3rd = 27, 4th = 25, 5th = 23, 6th = 21, 7th = 19, 8th = 17, 9th = 15, 10th = 13, 11th = 11, 12th = 9, 13th = 8, 14th = 7, 15th = 6, 16th = 5, 17th = 4, 18th = 3, 19th = 2, 20th = 1.
